

Our annual organizational meeting was called to order at 12:00 PM on March 24, 2025, to elect the officers of the Board for the coming year.

All Board members were present. New Board members, Robert Edgar and Joe Morabito, and incumbent member, Joe Closs, were welcomed to the Board.

Unanimously elected officers were President, Jon Dell'Antonia; Vice President and Treasurer, Michael Warner; and Secretary, Bill Arnold.

Next was the appointment of Directors as liaisons to the standing committees of the Board:

Amenities Committee: Robert ("Bob") Edgar.

Communications Committee: Secretary, Bill Arnold.

Finance Committee: VP & Treasurer, Michael Warner

Landscape & Grounds Committee: To Be Determined.

Modifications & Architectural Review Committee: Kristen Vartian.

Social Committee: Secretary, Bill Arnold.

Members of the Collections Committee added Secretary Bill Arnold to the Committee, and Director Bob Edgar was added to the Appeals Committee.

The meeting adjourned at 12:18 PM.

Board Meeting, March 27, 2025

The Board meeting was called to order at 12:30 PM by President Dell'Antonia. Six Board members were present. Director Closs did not attend. Attending were Grand Manors Vice President of On-site Management, our General Manager, our Financial Manager, Digital Content Director, Lifestyle Director, L&G Director, Maintenance Director, Power Group representative, and the Association's Attorney.

12 homeowners attended, 7 in person and 5 via Zoom. One homeowner asked about the status of repairs to Wellington Ponds. That work is currently in progress. Another asked about a creek flooding behind his house, and another addressed personal comments made to a homeowner by a Board member. We had held our Annual Meeting March 13, 2025.

Consent Agenda: Approved the February 27, 2025 BOD meeting minutes. We accepted the resignation of Board Member Joe Closs due to serious health issues in his family. We appointed former Board member James Buerkle to fill the vacated position and complete the remaining term of office. We approved Karen Gerace as a new member of the Landscape & Grounds Committee and Frank Spina as new member of the Communications Committee. We also appointed Director Buerkle as liaison the L&G Committee.

Old Business: We reviewed and approved the updated Appeals Process Policy, updated Modification Committee Guidelines, and updated Communications Committee Guidelines.

New Business: We approved the 2025 Pool Season Calendar with extended dates into September. We reviewed the monthly water usage report. To date, we are under budget by 76,000 gallons. We held discussions on the following topics: water rates and their impact on our budget, the financial condition of the HOA and our assessments, and the Reserve Study. No actions were taken. We discussed requests for private events to be held in our common areas. If we can approve the request, we will. Some will not fit in the requested area. We gave the courtesy patrol power to use law enforcement to have violators removed from the property if necessary. We approved the Treasurer to sign the annual audit for the Association.

Association Reports: Our Financial Manager reviewed the February Financial Reports: Balance Sheet, Operating Fund Revenue and Expenses, Restricted and Non Restricted Investment Schedule, Summary of Accounts Receivable, Bad Debt Expense/Reserve, and the Investment Performance Report.

Executive Session: We reviewed and approved the Foreclosure report. We accepted the Variance Report, Payment Plan Status Report, Collections Committee Reports, Appeals Committee Decisions, Violations Report, and the Projects Report. We discussed the status of the Stonebridge Drive and Virginia car accident. That property is owned by both the city and the Association. We are working together to determine how best to secure payment from the insurance company of the responsible party and get the repair underway. We approved sending a survey about the proposed Beach Club project to all homeowners to solicit their opinions. The survey is due to be completed by April 18. We sent out five RFPs to replace our current Financial Manager who no longer wished to manage our reserve fund. We received two responses and the Finance Committee recommended Frost Bank as our new Financial Manager. We signed the Agreement with them. We discussed the annual Wine Tasting event. If we have it again, there will be a charge to attend due to the high cost of this event and to reduce the number of "no shows" we have experienced. We receive updates on the following projects: Aquatic Center pool replastering, seasonal color reduction, Mulch reduction, Fence replacement, and Storm damage. The Association's attorney updated the Board on current legal matters.

The meeting adjourned at 7:16 PM.



Compliance Corner

Whether you're planting sod, ground cover, or adding shrubs along your home's exterior, early May is your window of opportunity to get those roots established while temperatures are still manageable.

From a compliance perspective, timely planting is also important. The Stonebridge Ranch Modification Design Guidelines (see page 46) outline clear expectations for lawn coverage and properly maintained foundation shrubs and other plants.

Dr. Moon, our trusted landscape consultant, recommends homeowners take advantage of the milder spring soil temperatures to plant grass seed, lay sod, or install shrubs with ample time for them to take root before the heat of June and July. Waiting too long can lead to transplant stress, shallow root systems, and more watering demands during peak drought conditions.

Winning The War On Weeds

Tips For Texas Lawns

As temperatures climb and summer approaches, keeping your lawn and landscape weed-free becomes more than just a matter of pride—it's a matter of community standards and compliance here in Stonebridge Ranch.

Unkempt lawns with visible weeds not only diminish the curb appeal of your property but can also affect the visual harmony of the entire neighborhood. Plus, our HOA guidelines are designed to help preserve the beauty and value of our community—which includes maintaining healthy, well-tended yards. Staying on top of weed control now will save you time, effort, and HOA notices later.

To help you stay ahead of the game, we've gathered a few expert-backed tips inspired by our landscape consultant, Dr. Robert E. Moon, tailored specifically for North Texas homeowners.

1. Mow at the Right Height—Not Too Short!

Mowing your grass too low can stress your lawn and give weeds an open invitation to spread. Dr. Moon recommends the following mowing heights for popular turfgrasses in our region:

• Common Bermuda: 1 ½ to 2 ½ inches

• Hybrid Bermuda: 1 inch

• Buffalo Grass: 2 ½ to 4 inches

Also, be sure to follow the 1/3 rule: never cut off more than one-third of the grass height at a time. Mow regularly enough to stay within that range and promote a dense, weed-resistant turf.

2. Apply Pre-Emergent Weed Control Now

May is your final call for effective warm-season weed prevention. Dr. Moon advises applying pre-emergent herbicide not just to planting beds, but also to your turf, shrubs, and ground cover beds.

This will help block the germination of aggressive summer weeds like crabgrass, spurge, and goosegrass, which thrive in Texas heat.

✓ Important: Always read and follow the product label for safe and effective use. Proper timing and application technique are essential for results.

3. Water Deep, Not Daily

Healthy, thick grass crowds out weeds naturally. One way to promote strong root systems is to water deeply but less frequently. This encourages your turf to dig in and withstand both heat and weed invasion.

Aim to water in the early morning hours, and check for runoff to make sure your lawn is absorbing moisture efficiently.

4. Keep Edges Tidy & Attack Weeds Early

Don't let weeds sneak in around driveways, sidewalks, or flower beds. Keep your landscape edges neatly trimmed and treat visible weeds as soon as they appear—either with a spot treatment or hand removal.

5. Fertilize and Maintain Lawn Health

A well-fed lawn is better equipped to resist stress and outcompete weeds. Use a slow-release fertilizer formulated for your grass type, and consider aerating compacted soil in high-traffic areas.

By staying proactive this season, you'll enjoy a lush, green yard that not only enhances your home's beauty but supports the standards we all value in Stonebridge Ranch.

What You Need to Know Before Making a Splash

To help all residents enjoy a safe and smooth pool experience, here are a few reminders:

- Photo ID Cards: Residents can enjoy the Aquatic Center for free with a valid Stonebridge Ranch photo ID. IDs are required for all residents ages 3 and up. Kids grow fast, so replacement cards are free as they age. Lost cards can be replaced at the association office for just \$5.
- Kids & Supervision: Children under 13 must be accompanied by a parent or designated guardian who is at least 18 years old.
- Guest Policies: Each household in good standing may bring up to eight guests on regular days and three guests on holidays such as Memorial Day, July 4th and Labor Day. Guest entry is \$5 for ages 3–49 and just \$1 for guests 50+.

As the weather warms up and neighbors head outside to enjoy the fresh air, it's the perfect time to appreciate the many ways your HOA dues are hard at work here in Stonebridge Ranch.

One of the gems of our community is the **Stonebridge Lake** Trail, a nearly 20-mile loop of walking and hiking paths that winds through some of the most scenic areas in the neighborhood. Along the way, you'll pass 15 serene lakes and ponds, open green spaces, and picturesque vistas that make springtime strolls especially rewarding. These trailsand the lush landscaping that surrounds them—are maintained and beautified using your HOA dues, ensuring they stay safe, clean, and welcoming year-round.

But the benefits of your dues go beyond the greenery. For added safety and convenience, our community also contains 11 City-owned tunnels and 5 Golf Courseowned tunnels beneath some of McKinney's busiest



intersections. These pedestrian tunnels help connect neighborhoods and parks while allowing residents to walk, jog, or bike without crossing major roads—making outdoor activity easier and safer for all ages.

Lawn & Order: May 2025

Spring has arrived and we are now in a transitional month. We can now feel those warmer days coming and we can still venture outdoors. This is the month to start wrapping up your spring plantings, vegetables, and get your summer annuals in. Planting them now is an important time frame as temperatures are conducive for good growth all the way around.

Tips for Watering in May

Be sure to properly water everything to keep them from wilting but also train those roots to find water. Finding that balance is crucial and will take some care and monitoring. For new seeded and planted plants daily water for the first week is suitable and as the grow in reduce watering. For both establishing plants and mature plants, watering 1-2 days a week is adequate. In the month of May for we should be replacing half into one inch of water per week depending on rainfall. Remember a good watering schedule will help keep them from wilting and drive the roots down

Other spring items to consider are making sure your lawns are mowed frequently, and your shrubs are trimmed only to remove the new growth without heavy cuts. Removing only one third of the lawn when mowing will help keep your lawn from stressing out. Heavy pruning cuts on your ornamentals are **not** recommended this time frame.



Look out for Disease and Pests

You should also consider monitoring disease and insect issues this month. As spring humidity has been on the rise and temperatures reach into the 80s, spring insects like Aphids, Whiteflies, and Scale are common on ornamental plants. Grubs, chinch bugs, and many other pests can show up on your lawn as well. Also, watch out for diseases like Powdery Mildew, Phytophthora, Rhizoctonia, Brown Patch, and Large Patch on your lawns and landscape plants.

In fact, the best advice for plants this month/season is to start looking for signs of stress. Flip up leaves and check the underside for insect issues. Check leaves, stems, and roots for abnormalities.



Start Sooner than Later

So go ahead - start your watering program and watch for signs of stress that are abnormal before the summer heat kicks in. If you need additional help, there are so many easily accessible resources out there to help you, like your local nursery professional or your local <u>Texas A&M Extension Office</u>. See you next month!



NEW Wildflower Grow Zones

Have you ever driven down Texas interstates, highways or along a rural road and see homeowners stop to take family photos of the beauty for our Texas wildflowers? What if you had a local spot to just enjoy them or for photography of beautiful flowers and majestic butterflies?




Did you know that with the vast area that covers the community, only 63% of our 500 acres is landscaped? Many of the landscape areas which are mowed frequently are old pastures which did support pollinators like hummingbirds, bees, butterflies, moths, and small mammals.



The Decline of Pollinators

Did you also know the state of Texas has a huge need for supporting the habitats for pollinators, and the bee population is declining - both domesticated bees used for honey production and the wild populations. As natural threats and urbanization cause the decline in our pollinators, we must consider how pollinators play a vital role in farmlands, personal gardens, landscapes and in natural flora and fauna. Without pollinators, our ecosystem will diminish.



Why Do We Need Pollinators?

Without pollinators, we would potentially lose our Texas Wildflowers like Bluebonnets and Indian Paint Brushes. As farms and ranchlands across the DFW metroplex are consumed by expanding subdivisions, commercial projects, and retail centers, the urgency to restore lost habitats and ecosystems continues to grow.

At the April Landscape and Grounds Committee Meeting last year, our dedicated homeowner volunteers (who make up the committee) along with two members of the Board of Directors attended the meeting and discussed the idea of introducing wildflowers in designated areas throughout the community. The concept received unanimous support from those in attendance.

In May, the concept was revisited by both the Landscape and Grounds Committee and the Board of Directors. This time it was reviewed with the aid of aerial mapping for plans on contract service levels in common areas, which included the designated wildflower zones. Finally, in October, the Board of Directors officially approved the initiative as part of the landscape contracts.

Looking ahead

Looking ahead, there are key seasonal milestones involved in developing these areas, including seeding, mowing, fertilization, and targeted weed control. Unlike traditional turf or lawn spaces, wildflower areas require different mowing frequencies and heights. After flowering and seed dispersal, these areas must be cut back to support healthy regeneration. Additionally, wildflowers need time to reach their natural height to bloom properly.
